Bios

Herbert Burkert is the president of the Research Center for Information Law, University of St. Gallen, Switzerland. He has served as an advisor to national and regional governments as well as to international organizations. He has studied law, political science, and history at the University of Cologne (Germany) and the University of Dublin (Ireland).).

Rubkwan Choldumrongkul is a Thai qualified lawyer who has been actively working in providing legal advice on the governance and the structure of technology and innovative business operation in Thailand to find the balance of being strictly in compliance with the relevant laws and regulations while preserving their innovative valued preposition and recently embarked on her new venture to tackle personal data protection and governance under the GDPR scheme and the local PDPA. She will be leading the research team on AI and Big Data Governance for electronic transaction in Thailand in collaboration with ETDA as the Research Director.

Sandra Cortesi is a Fellow at the Berkman Klein Center for Internet & Society at Harvard University and the Director of Youth and Media. She is responsible for coordinating the Youth and Media's policy, research, and educational initiatives, and is leading the collaboration between the Berkman Klein Center and UNICEF. At Youth and Media Sandra works closely with talented young people and lead researchers in the field as they look into innovative ways to approach social challenges in the digital world.

Christian Fieseler is professor for communication management at BI Norwegian Business School and a director of the Nordic Centre for Internet and Society. His research and teaching is focused on the question how



individuals and organizations adapt to the shift brought by new technology, and how to design participative and inclusive spaces in this new media regime.

Urs Gasser is the Executive Director of the Berkman Klein Center for Internet & Society at Harvard University and a Professor of Practice at Harvard Law School. His research and teaching activities focus on information law, policy, and society issues and the changing role of academia in the digitally networked age.

Malavika Jayaram is the inaugural Executive Director of the Digital Asia Hub. Prior to her relocation to Hong Kong, she spent three years as a Fellow at the Berkman Klein Center for Internet and Society at Harvard University: she has been a Faculty Affiliate of the centre since 2017. A technology lawyer for over 15 years, she practised law at Allen & Overy, London, and was Vice President and Technology Counsel at Citigroup.

Yingyong Tanthanapongphan is a Harvard & Stanford-educated serial entrepreneur in financial services. He co-founded Cartrust to help provide bridge financing for micro-entrepreneurs who use car for their business and also as collateral to get refinanced when they need cash or working capital for their business operation. He also founded Credit OK in 2018 to provide credit risk solutions for micro-entrepreneurs and SMEs in Thailand and Southeast Asia. Before venturing on his own, Jet worked for SCG, one of the largest conglomerates in Southeast Asia, in intellectual property strategy and management. He serves as Co-Founder and CEO of the Digital Asia Hub Thailand (DAH.th).
